# SUMMER STEPHAN

## SAN DIEGO COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Opening *One Safe Place* – The North County Family Justice Center on July 5, 2022 brought my dream of transforming and regionalizing victim services to reality. As a 34-year prosecutor in San Diego County, I am proud to say my office is the largest provider of victim services, helping over 14,000 crime victims yearly. I saw firsthand the barriers our victims faced traveling to many places throughout our 4,500 square mile county to get help on what can be their most broken day. I studied the worldwide best practice Family Justice Center model, pioneered by Casey Gwinn and Gael Strack, and knew we needed multiple centers in our county to increase access for victims and to prioritize prevention of future harm. I envisioned the intersection of public health and public safety, with co-located partner agencies such as Palomar Health, a nationally accredited Child Advocacy Center and designated Trauma Recovery Center, alongside law enforcement, coming together to interrupt cycles of violence within families. My vision was grounded in research such as the landmark 1995–1997 ACES (Adverse Childhood Experiences) study. With early intervention in one's trauma lifespan, we can disrupt a potential school to prison pipeline and help gain equal access for all communities. I went first to our data, which revealed that North County had a disproportionate amount of intimate partner homicides and other crimes, victimizing children and older adults – our most vulnerable citizens. After further developing critical collaborative partnerships with victim service providers, we were able to open our doors. This was also thanks to the support of leaders such as San Marcos Mayor Rebecca Jones, County Supervisor Jim Desmond and the County Board of Supervisors under the leadership of Chairwoman Nora Vargas.

For two years, *One Safe Place* has given compassionate, no-cost, safe, trauma and culturally informed care for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, elder abuse, dependent adult abuse, child abuse, hate crimes, bullying, identity theft and gang violence. Our collaborative village with over 100 partner agencies provides extensive support services, trauma treatment, legal assistance, health and wellness, peer support, thriver services designed to provide hope, healing and justice. We have served as “the community's space,” bringing thousands through our doors for educational and awareness events, designed to increase access to victims and share information about keeping our community safe.

My vision is to regionalize centers like this with the support of our sister Family Justice Center in downtown San Diego led by City Attorney Mara Elliott. Every survivor should be able to walk in doors like these and be provided services that can transform trauma to healing.

One of my favorite authors and poets, Maya Angelou, once said, “People will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel.” Thank you to the dedicated professionals and over 100 partners for making the most vulnerable feel like they can attain the Hope, Healing and Justice that every human being deserves.

# PEOPLE SERVED AT **ONE SAFE PLACE**

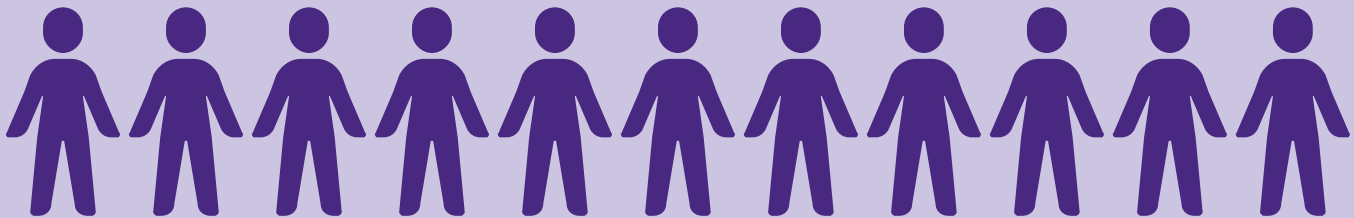

We've served **5,518** individuals since opening. *Words matter* here. We refer to those who walk in our doors as "guests," because we want them to feel like a guest in our home. When they come back for services, they are called "members," because we recognize the importance and power of community especially for those who have been told they don't belong, they don't matter, or their voice is irrelevant. When guests arrive, they are greeted by a Welcome Ambassador, accompanied into our Welcome Hub and offered snacks, books and a comfortable chair to take a breath, charge their phone or have their children watched in our adjacent child waiting room. A specially trained Care Coordinator hosts guests in our specially designed Care Rooms where risk, safety, and needs are assessed in a dialogue with our guest. A trained Case Manager offers a menu of wrap-around services. Together, a care plan is developed, informed by our guest and with our guest's consent. The goal is to provide an experience that dignifies and provides agency.

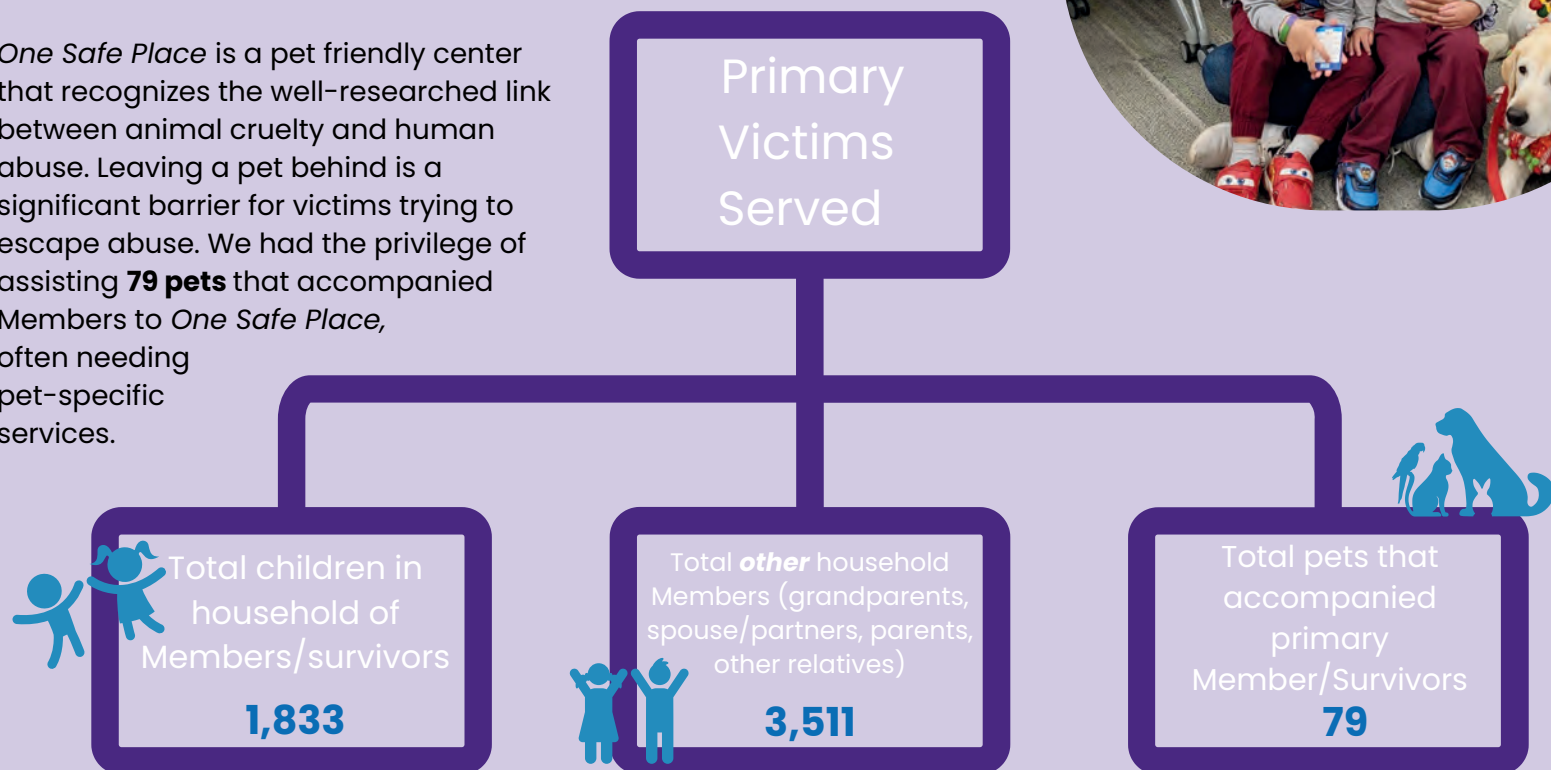
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# MEMBER/SURVIVOR HOUSEHOLDS

Our service model supports the safety and health needs of the victim's entire household. For victims served in our first two years, **1,833 minor dependents** (children/teens) and **3,511 other household members** (grandparents, spouses/partners, parents, other relatives) were also helped.

*One Safe Place* is a pet friendly center that recognizes the well-researched link between animal cruelty and human abuse. Leaving a pet behind is a significant barrier for victims trying to escape abuse. We had the privilege of assisting **79 pets** that accompanied Members to *One Safe Place*, often needing pet-specific services.

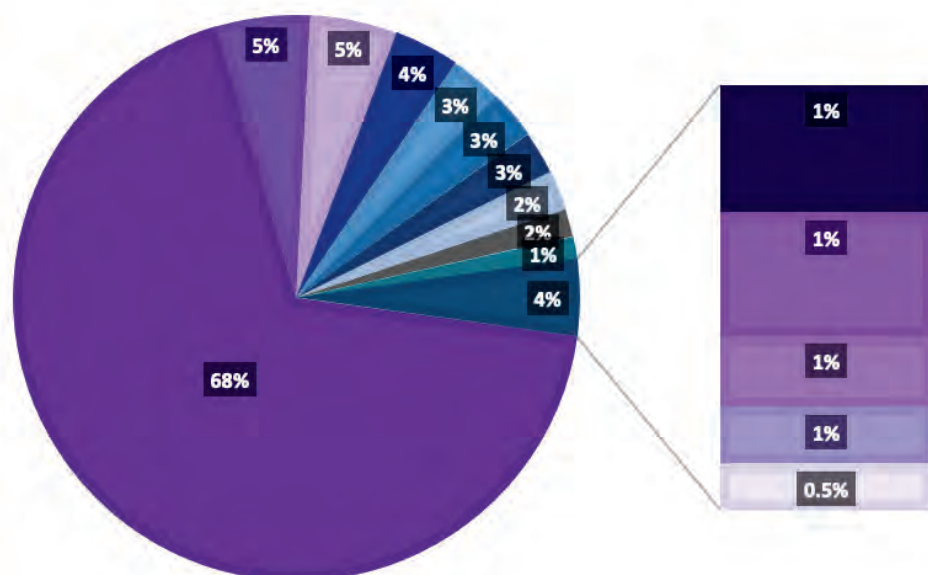
The decision to seek services is a courageous first step for victims. It's important for many of our victims/Members to continue to come back to the center for that next counseling appointment, that next meeting with a partner agency, or that next visit with their Case Manager. We're proud that over half our victims/Members come back for repeated services and a continuum of care. Victims return to *One Safe Place* for services such as legal assistance, therapy, Case Management, workforce readiness workshops, Peer Support, and self-sufficiency programs (e.g., CalFresh).

## ■ 280 Forensic Services – Adult Exams

A forensic examination is a best practice standard of care for victimization-related injury, sexual assault, sex abuse, and strangulation. These consent-based evidentiary exams are performed by trained health care professionals who assess the victim's health care needs, coordinate treatment for any injuries, offer support and crisis intervention, and collect and document any potential evidence. There were 280 adult forensic evidentiary exams conducted over two years at *One Safe Place*. Victims are then connected to Care Coordinators for additional services and support by our onsite partner agencies and the *One Safe Place* care team.

## ■ 578 Child Advocacy Center – Forensic Interviews

Our nationally accredited Child Advocacy Center conducted 109 medical evidentiary exams and 578 forensic interviews with children and teens since opening. Forensic interviews are performed in our state-of-the-art, specially designed interview spaces by trained Social Workers. This ensures children don't have to share their experience with multiple agencies and provides time to assess any needed protective support.



## ■ 10,160 Case Management Services

Victims received over 10,000 services from Case Managers including safety planning, resource navigation, hands-on assistance with applications for services, and more.

## ■ 6,756 Trauma Therapy Sessions

Our Palomar Health Trauma Recovery Center therapists conducted 6,756 therapy sessions with children, teens and adults. These included treatment modalities such as art therapy, music therapy, and specific trauma therapies shown to reduce PTSD symptoms such as Child and Family Traumatic Stress Intervention (CFTSI) and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR).

*One Safe Place* is a proud host of two transformational evidence-based programs designed to mitigate the effects of trauma, to reduce PTSD symptoms, and to ensure children aren't defined by their victimization. We're a Camp Hope America (CHA) affiliate and we provide children/teens a weeklong, choice-based, challenge filled summer camp proven to improve hope and resiliency. Children referred by our Case Managers and who are in a state of readiness participate in yearlong "Pathways" program. This is a trauma-focused mentorship intervention with a dedicated curriculum designed to change the way kids exposed to trauma believe in themselves, believe in others, believe in their dreams, and find hope for the future. There's also a protective parent component where non-offending parents participate in a simultaneous program called "Turning Pages" where they learn how to best parent children who have experienced trauma.



We had **2,751 children** visit our **child waiting room**, where volunteers and staff provided social-emotional learning activities, books, and play while guardians received services.

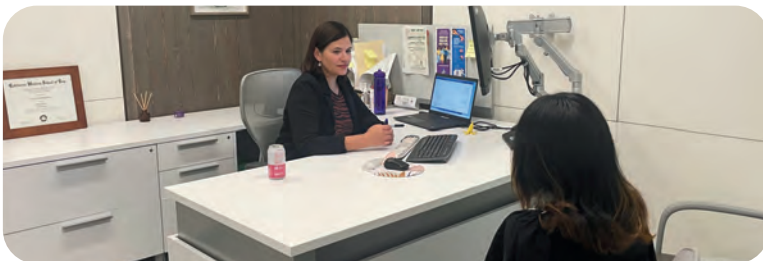

# THRIVER SERVICES

### OSP Led Multi-Disciplinary Teams

*One Safe Place* is home to a variety of multi-disciplinary teams where partners from various agencies come together to brainstorm best practice solutions. This includes two Coordinated Community Response teams: *Abuse in Later Life*, focused on increasing access to services by older adult victims, and *Improving Criminal Justice Response*, focused on projects such as safe firearm removal in domestic violence cases. Our *Diversity Equity and Inclusion (DEI)* team works to improve the inclusivity and access for victims and professionals at *One Safe Place*.

### Workforce Readiness

Partner agencies provide ongoing financial, educational and employment workshops, empowering survivors to take next steps toward securing credit, getting a degree, or getting a job.



### Peer Thriver Group/VOICES, Peer Support Groups, and Empowerment Classes

Peer-led groups and workshops are critical to helping victims find community and begin to thrive. Survivors who choose and are ready are offered opportunities with Peer Thriver and VOICES groups in English and Spanish. They work to create friendships and build skills and confidence to share their story publicly at trainings, prevention activities and events, and provide guidance for improving our services, practices, and awareness efforts.

### CONTACT OSP

Our Care team assisted 13,000 callers on our main “hope line” connecting victims, professionals, and community members to information, support, and services. The team returned an additional 454 calls for service from victim callers and responded to 2,372 emails.

# BRINGING HOPE

### HOPE SCALES

Hope is defined in research as the positive expectation individuals have about the attainment of a future oriented goal. Hope, in children and adults, can be measured and it can improve when victims are given proper support. *One Safe Place* uses an assessment tool called the Hope Scale, developed by Snyder et. al (1997) that examines the extent to which children and adults believe they can establish pathways to their goals and develop and maintain the will power to follow these pathways. Adults and children answer a series of questions to determine a hope "score" that helps our service professionals customize each victim's care with interventions that can increase hope and resiliency. Increases in hope scores are associated with perceived competence and self-worth, lower rates of depression and anxiety, and long-term impacts such as one's ability to take actions to go to college, seek employment and avoid entrance into the criminal justice system. Members who received services at OSP **increased their Hope Scores an average of 4.5 points.** Adult HOPE scales **increased by 5 points** and Child Hope Scales **improved by an average of 4 points.**

**Hope Moment:** An immigrant mother sought services after 15 years of chronic abuse in Guatemala and the U.S. She felt an immense emotional relief upon finding law enforcement to be responsive and caring. After our team helped her navigate to safe emergency housing and legal services, she was able to return to her home feeling safe, free and empowered.

**Hope Moment:** A new member received support after fleeing domestic violence. Our team assisted her with obtaining a restraining order and safety planning. While walking through our center, her sandal ripped, causing her distress. Our team took her to the boutique, where she was able to select a new pair of sandals and clothing. The member left with dignity and was very grateful to our team.

**Hope Moment:** A former Los Angeles domestic violence and human trafficking survivor fled with her children to San Diego, where she unfortunately became vulnerable to exploitation once again. Our team connected her with rapid rehousing, therapy for her children, and with partner agencies that helped cover her phone bill and car payment for two months, so she could regain stability. She also received childcare and homeless assistance, while receiving trauma support and case management from our team. With this support and a wealth of resources, she was able to secure a full-time position as a teacher in a cosmetology program.

**Hope Moment:** An elder abuse and domestic violence victim sought guidance after his partner of 10 years assaulted him. He had already obtained a restraining order with a move-out order. Initially, he was solely looking for guidance, support, and reassurance, fearing he might allow the abuser back into his home. After speaking with one of our Care Coordinators, he felt confident to obtain a permanent restraining order and felt validated in his decision. He left *One Safe Place* feeling assured about his choice to leave the abusive relationship behind.





# OSP OUTREACH & EVENTS

More than 21,000 people have taken part in events, trainings, and meetings at *One Safe Place*. These have included critical trainings for professionals and outreach and prevention events for community members in both English and Spanish. We have 1,518 followers on our Facebook and Instagram accounts and the *One Safe Place* website has garnered 126,545 views.

Volunteers are the heartbeat of *One Safe Place* and we cannot do this work without them.
