2026 ANNUAL MILITARY EQUIPMENT REPORT

RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file the San Diego District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigation Annual Military Equipment Report, determine each type of equipment in the Report has complied with the standards for approval set forth in Government Code section 7071(d), and make all determinations required by Assembly Bill 481, subject to the provisions of section 955 of the San Diego County Code of Administrative Ordinances. Review and renew Ordinance 10789.

BACKGROUND

On September 30, 2021, Governor Newsom signed into law Assembly Bill 481 (AB 481). Codified in Government Code sections 7070-7075, AB 481 required the governing body of a law enforcement agency approve a military equipment use policy for such equipment to be requested, acquired, or deployed by the agency.

On May 10, 2022, the San Diego County Board of Supervisors approved and adopted the San Diego County District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigation Military Equipment Use Policy under Article LXIV Section 955 of the San Diego County Code of Administrative Ordinances (Ordinance 10789).

Additionally, Government Code 7072 requires law enforcement agencies present an Annual Military Equipment Report to their governing body detailing the use, complaints or concerns, results of any internal audits, annual costs, quantity possessed by the agency, and intent to purchase additional equipment in the following year.

DETAILS

Use of Military Equipment

- Colt AR-15 rifles were deployed while executing search warrants, arrest warrants, and during the training of law enforcement personnel.
- Miscellaneous firearms of various calibers, makes, and models which qualify as "assault weapons" under CA law were displayed during firearms education courses for District Attorney personnel to enhance their understanding of firearm operation and capabilities in support of firearms related prosecutions.
- Pepper ball launcher and pepper balls were deployed during the execution of search and arrest warrants, and used during the training of law enforcement personnel.



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- 12 Gauge Less Lethal Impact Munitions Launchers (bean bag shotguns) were deployed during the execution of search and arrest warrants, and used during the training of law enforcement personnel.
- DJI Mavic 3 Enterprise drone was deployed during the execution of search and arrest warrants, aerial photographs, and during the training of law enforcement personnel.
- DJI Avata drone was deployed during the execution of search and arrest warrants, and during the training of law enforcement personnel.

Complaints or Concerns

A review of department records revealed no complaints or concerns raised regarding the use of the Bureau's military equipment within the past year.

Internal Audit

An internal audit determined there were no violations of Bureau policy 5.9 – Military Equipment Use, or any other Bureau policy related to the acquisition or deployment of the Bureau's military equipment.
